Barbara N. FITTON, Age 74, a resident of Berkeley Square Retirement Community died at her residence on Sunday, October 7, 2007. Barbara also leaves behind her dearest and most cherished friends, Ann Antenen, June Steed, Janie Braun and Brenda Anderson. Also left to mourn her is her best companion of all, her beloved dog, Mandy. She was preceded in death by her mother and stepfather, Mildred and Charles Schwing. A Memorial Service will be held Thursday, October 11, 2007 at 11 a.m. at Weigel Funeral Home, 980 N. W. Washington Blvd. with Hospice Chaplain Galen Hoffmann officiating.
