*interview, a touch, a kiss, a bit of absurdity, good socks or red wine, the taste of fresh salmon or Tikka Masala, a soft cotton shirt, a lovely portrait, voice, piece of music or chocolate. He noticed. He gave it his full attention and truly appreciated it!*

*While he may have experienced life on a different path than many, his connections with those past and present always informed his life and fed his appreciation for what it means to be fully human. In turn, he shared intimately and generously with those of us who walked beside him for a while.*
